1. MANAGED CARE OPPORTUNITY ASSESSMENT (UPDATED 2-8-21)

Alabama has approximately 1 million Medicaid members. In July 2017, the state dropped a plan to transition Medicaid to provider-led, risk-based Regional Care Organizations (RCOs). The state cited "federal regulations, funding considerations, and the potential for new opportunities for state flexibility regarding Medicaid." Approximately two-thirds of the state's Medicaid members were expected to be enrolled in RCOs in five regions beginning October 2017. RCOs would have taken risk through capitated contracts with the state, managed benefits, and coordinated care. Instead, the state will pursue other alternatives.

In April 2019, the state awarded Alabama Coordinated Health Network (ACHN) contracts to BCBS/My Care Alabama, Alabama Care Network, Gulf Coast Total Care, and North Alabama Community Care. The program is aimed at consolidating care coordination services across various state Medicaid programs. The initiative has impacted Health Home, which provides care coordination for individuals with certain chronic conditions; Maternity Care, a waiver program started in 1988 to address the state's high infant mortality rate; and Plan First, which provides family planning services. The state has contracted with Primary Care Case Management Entities in seven newly defined regions to coordinate services. Contracts are effective October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2021. Under the ACHN program, the Patient 1st program, a traditional Medicaid Primary Care Case Management program, ceased to exist and capitation payments ended as of September 30, 2019.

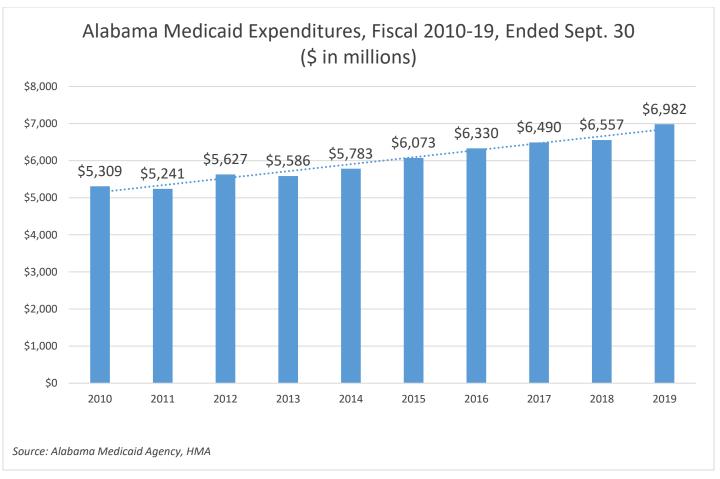

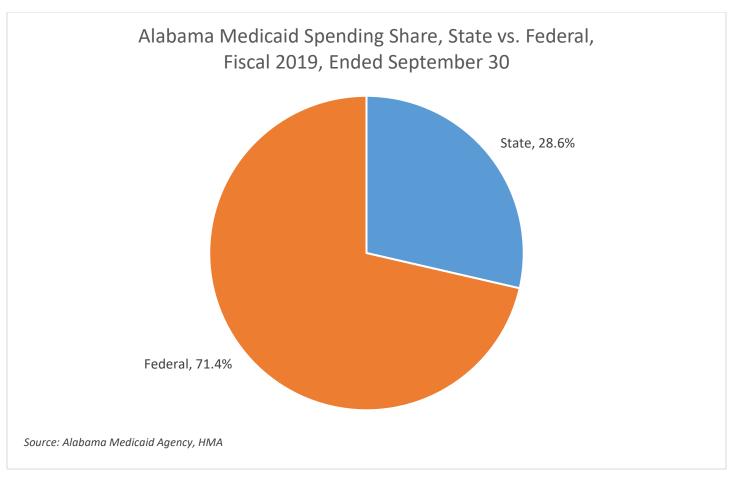

2. MEDICAID EXPENDITURES

Alabama Medicaid expenditures were nearly 7 billion in fiscal 2019, ended September 30, the latest data available. That's up 6.5% from the prior fiscal year. 28.6% of Medicaid expenditures are funded by the state, and 71.4% are funded by the federal government.

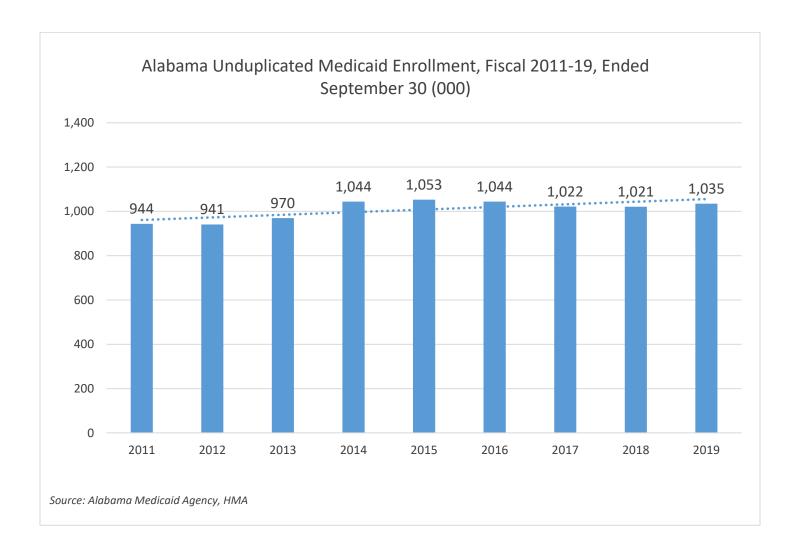

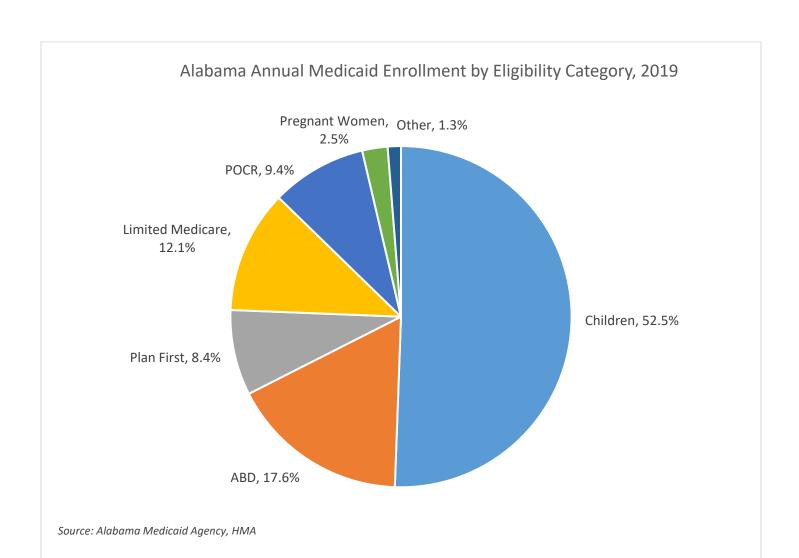
